

Sharon's Sharings

As you read this, you will have already enjoyed Easter, with maybe an Easter Egg or two tucked under your belt, and are now looking forwards to early summer. But that lovely chocolate Easter Egg that you enjoyed so much is part of an interesting history.


Easter Eggs, or Paschal Eggs as they were called, were possibly first made by the early Christians in Mesopotamia as ordinary eggs stained red in memory of the blood shed by Jesus on the Cross. There are many fascinating stories and traditions about how and why Paschal Eggs came to be part of Christian life. One such tradition was that Mary Magdalene told the Roman emperor Tiberius Julius Caesar about the resurrection of Jesus. The unconvinced emperor pointed to an egg on the dining table and said that there was as much chance of a human being returning to life as there was for the egg to turn red - and immediately the egg miraculously turned red.

Later, the Christian Church officially adopted the custom, regarding the eggs as a symbol of the resurrection of Jesus. In the Roman Rite of 1610, the coloured eggs eaten at Easter would be accompanied by the blessing:

"Lord. let the grace of vour blessing come upon these eggs, that they be healthful food for your faithful who eat them in thanksgiving for the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you forever and ever."

In the 17th and 18th centuries red coloured eggs evolved to egg-shaped toys which

were given to children at Easter, and the Victorians decorated papier mâché and satin filled with gifts eggs covered and chocolates. In the 19th century came the fabulous jewelled creations of Carl Fabergé made for the Russian Czar and Czarina, and then later in the 19th century it began to be said that Easter Eggs came about through the German springtime festivities of a Germanic goddess known in Old English as Eostre. The first chocolate Easter Eggs were beautifully made in France and Germany in the early 19th century, with the first Easter Eggs such as we know and love today being cleverly made by Cadbury in 1875.



So, within this illustrious history of that humble chocolate egg that you enjoyed so much, is a simple message of hope - the message of the death and resurrection of Jesus.

A holy and righteous God, once created a holy and righteous humanity to live in love and friendship with Him. We were created with freewill so our love for God would be freely given. But humanity chose in its freewill to go its own way so the Holy relationship with God was broken, and humanity has floundered in its sin ever since. But God sent His only Son Jesus Christ to pay the price for our sinfulness Himself, so that everyone who believed in Jesus could be restored to fellowship with Him.

We have a God who holds out His hands to us day after day, moment after moment, offering us eternal life with Him if only we would accept that He is who He has said He is, and has done through Jesus what He says He has done. His death and resurrection give us hope – hope for the future, but also hope for the present. Not only can we look forward to an eternal life with God, but He is near to us, waiting to hold, guide and help us through this life too.

It is hope that we celebrate at Easter. Hope for everyone, rich or poor, weak or strong, young or old from anywhere or with any past, and God is still holding out His hands to us inviting us into His love and friendship.






Yvonne Ellis is Founder of **Daughter Arise**, a peer empowerment



Well, the 8-session course on **"The Bible"** has finished.

Thanks to the 60 or so people

who came so regularly. We hope it was the first stage in an exciting Reading Adventure, to discover more of easily the greatest book ever written. Of course, as we found out, it is not 1 but 66 books!

We worked out when many of the well-known Bible characters lived on the Time Line of history. We tried to link judges with leaders, kings with prophets. We shared the ups and (more) downs of God's people. We noticed how much was actually written down at the time, which obviously makes the text more reliable when it was compiled later. How smart of God to arrange for four different records of Jesus' life, all from different perspectives, to give us such a multi-faceted view.

So, what next? Well, perhaps many of us will be more enthusiastic to read God's Word, more believing in its truth, and more understanding of some of the fascinating background. Some of us may find it easier to seek – and read – those small pesky books which we have tended to overlook, or can't find. Some may be looking at the use of Daily Bible reading notes. Some will look at a passage in more than one Bible version, to help us see some further truth.

A few House Groups have started using this resource. This is good – an opportunity to look in more depth at the 66 books which make up the Bible in more depth. This is bound to help our Christian growth. So, the Bible Course may be completed for now, but studying and appreciating God's Word should go on for ever.

The Bible in the picture pleads "Read Me". May the dust be wiped off all our Bibles!

Men's Ministry

The past year has been a fulfilling year for the men that meet on a monthly basis at Christ Church. We gather in the Cafe, the Hall or sometimes in the Undercroft with the theme of "Real Ale, Real Issues and Real Conversation".

God has certainly blessed us in so many ways. He has put us together and created an environment where blokes can be honest, with themselves and each other, knowing that we not there to judge, but to support and encourage one another. We can certainly say that our conversations have been "Real" and the "Issues" we tackle have been challenging and at the same time incredibly uplifting; all this whilst enjoying some good food, real ale and the occasional banter.

The last year has taken us through a revised resource by Christian Vision for Men called "The Code Unlocked". This is based on a small booklet called The Code that is written for men who aim to be wholehearted

followers of Jesus. In short it has twelve codes for men to live by, these are:

- i. Jesus is my Captain, Brother, Rescuer and Friend.
- ii. I owe everything to Him. I will do anything for Him.
- iii. I will unashamedly make Him known through my actions and words.
- iv. I will not cheat in anything, personal or professional.
- v. I will look away from the gutter, but be prepared to pull people out of it.
- vi. I will keep my body fit and free from any addictions.
- vii. I will put the welfare of those closest to me before my own welfare.
- viii. I will treat all men and women as brothers and sisters.
- ix. I will lead as He would lead. I will honour my leaders provided this also honours Him. I will follow Him in company with my sisters and brothers.
- x. I will use my strength to protect the weak and stand against the abuse of power.
- xi. I will protect the world that God has made.
- xii. If I fail, I will not give up. He never gives up on me.

What a tremendous privilege it has been to walk this walk together with such a great group of guys. The personal stories, the impactful witnessing and the authentic vulnerability has meant that we have grown closer as brothers and undoubtedly, we have all undergone a personal shift to be better followers of Jesus. Thank you, God, for this ministry! During the year we also have the occasional guest speaker as well as some regular events, like our Christmas party where we enjoy 'God's Wallop' ale from our local Westerham Brewery and a Summer BBQ (or braai) that will be announced shortly.

We pray that God will continue to bless us as men who love Jesus and wish to enjoy an ever-closer walk with Him. We pray that God will take more men by the hand and bring them along to our Friday night gatherings to share and grow together. We pray that as we grow, we experience the joy that can only come from knowing that we are deeply loved and cherished by a Dad who is the Creator of the universe.

The next resource we will be exploring is called "52 Men of the Bible". We hope to go on a journey together to discover more about the well-known and lesser known heroes of the Bible and most importantly learn more about ourselves and God's unique plan for our lives. Cafe Manager, Christ Church, Orpington



Christ Church Community Club: HISTORY

The Club was started in 1973

At the beginning about 12 to 20 people attended. Meetings were in the small hall at the time, and the church.

Grace Dane led the team together with Janet Crossley. Community Club and Tea & Toys were initially inspired by Dorothy Jones, wife of the vicar, who sadly became aware of a terminal illness shortly afterwards so was unable to work with them. However, both Clubs are still flourishing 46 years later!

At first a sandwich lunch was provided but this quickly developed into a hot meal, cooked mainly in volunteers homes and numbers built to 40+. Sometimes an exercise video, by Eileen Fowler followed.

Alan Eaves, vicar from 1982 to 2003, instigated the involvement of first-time offenders with the Club, a system that has worked very well when things are going right and this meant that volunteers were a bit freer to expand ideas.

In around 2003 Greta Kitchener took over the leadership of the volunteers. Assisted ably by husband Alan, she was a dynamic leader. This was before the kitchens were available, and hot meals were continued to be cooked by volunteers at home and heated, in various ways, at the back of the church.

Things became much easier when the new Church Halls and kitchen became available in May 2005. Numbers grew to about 80 regularly attending and 120-130 members belonging.

Greta introduced the Christian-input sessions, from 11 till 12 o'clock every meeting and became very popular, with about 25-30 regularly attending this part of the day; they start with coffee and biscuits and, maybe, even cake!

In January 2017 Mel Ketchin took over leadership of the team

The Club has maintained its momentum and is still flourishing. Membership continues at around 130, and 80 or so attend each week.

Christ Church Community Club: PRESENT DAY

We meet every Tuesday during school term dates. Members pay £3.50 for a 3-course hot meal followed by teas and coffees, from 12.45pm until around 2.30pm

- (i) Homemade soup
- (ii) Hot meal with meat and vegetables
- (iii) Homemade desserts with custard or cream.

Fresh flowers are placed on each table, and members take them home at the end.

We have a bring-and-buy stall – for clothes, knick-knacks, jigsaws, books, etc.

There is a fruit & veg stall where items are bought in bulk and sold as close to cost price as possible, e.g. melons, pineapples, cauliflowers are cut into portion sizes and wrapped carefully. Homemade marmalades and jams are often for sale too.

NB Any profit made and monies collected from the stalls go into club funds and will eventually subsidise outings for the club.

Before the lunch session there is a onehour session with some Christian input led by many different volunteers. Members are still greeted with coffee biscuits and cake. Around 25 to 30 people attend this first session.

Birthdays are celebrated with personal cards and small gifts.

Leadership

There is a very willing and able team of volunteers led by our hard-working leader Mel Ketchin.

Mel, with the help of Andi, orders and collects all the food and she does much of the secretarial work. This can be quite considerable, e.g. data necessary for contacting Club members; protection data; medical records – all information to be kept securely. Careful weekly accounts are kept.

The main volunteer team have taken tests to show they have completed the course to care for vulnerable elderly people. Each has a role in fire protection and some have first aid training. A register of attendees is taken each day.

A valuable team of drivers, organised by Bill Whitman, bring people to the club at both start times and take them home at the end of each session. Volunteers wash tea towels, aprons, etc. at home. None of this could operate if the club did not have the support of First-time offenders working off their hours by supporting the community.

These are ably led by Sally, who does an excellent job in organising and helping her team to produce a superb meal, as well as preparing all the tables and chairs beforehand and then a massive clear up at the end.

Pastoral care continues throughout the week, and during the holiday periods. Club members do a great job in supporting each other.

Other Activities

During the lunch sessions various forms of entertainment may take place, e.g. talks on local history; Hearing dogs; Police – protection in our homes; Devices to help the elderly; Armchair exercises. Also, singers, e.g. old-time music hall, gospel choir; local choirs and schools.

Every year we celebrate Christmas with a big party, a wonderful Christmas lunch, some entertainment, and each member gets a gift, a card and a jar of jam. About 130 people come for this occasion. The previous week we are privileged to watch a local school rehearse their nativity play.

About 4 or 5 times a year, outings are organised, perhaps river trips, visits to the seaside, shopping trips, or Brick Lane music hall. Usually a coach is used, and subsidised from club funds to around 50% of the cost – we are fortunate to have had Derek as our regular coach driver, but, sadly, he will not be with us in future. Food is always included in our outings. Meals are often taken to members who are in need and cannot attend the club.

The most important aspect is the sense of Community that comes from all areas – the volunteer leaders, the team of offenders who usually give their time very graciously (indeed, some have returned to help us even after they have worked off their hours), the 130 or so members. Christ Church, by providing excellent halls and kitchen, maintenance staff. especially Jim, and secretarial help. especially Jacqui, and our regular weekly drivers.

In Summary:

As always, with any successful organisation, such as this, there is a constant need for volunteers, so if any of you feel that this is where God would like you to be, please talk to us. There is always a great need of drivers, even if you cannot stay for the whole session.

I felt shy of it for some time and now, 16 years later, I realise that the calling was there, and we all get a wonderful feeling of happiness, along with slight tiredness, each Tuesday! For many of the people who attend club, this may be their only outing in the week and there is always a huge amount of gratitude shown.
