As our thoughts might tend towards what we are going to do for Christmas, what presents we need to buy, and where we might spend that special day, let's pause for a moment to think about Advent.

Advent can sometimes be consumed with busyness, shopping, and preparations, but it is a very special time in its own right, and deserves some attention.

It begins with the first Sunday of Advent on Sunday 1st December on which some of us will put Advent Wreaths on our doors the first sign of Christmas in our homes and in church we light the first of our candles. There Advent are many variations of what each of the five candles on the Advent wreath stands for, but a common theme is: first the Patriarchs, second the Prophets, third John the Baptist, fourth the virgin Mary, and finally Jesus Christ. choice of gift has given; wanting to share fun, laughter, food and drink with other people; writing cards to people they may not have seen in years to let them know they still care enough to keep in touch with them; even wanting to share a friendly smile or word with complete strangers. It is as if in honour of Jesus' birthday God too gives us a present – the present of a loving spirit to give us a small taste of how good it is to live in His love.

He gives us a second present as well. Who wrote "GENESIS"?

OLY BIBLE

Last issue we found out that the third Gospel was written by Doctor Luke, who also wrote the Acts of the Apostles.

This article is getting to the deep end!

GENESIS, the first book of the Bible, refers to stories and history which took place before writing as we know it was properly developed. We haven't got contemporary records of how the Book was built up. So, not easy! But we are undeterred!

Evangelical Christians believe that the Bible is a special book whose writers were inspired in a special way by God. No-one knows exactly how this works. And hasn't science disproved it all anyway? Well, the easy answer to that is: Definitely No! The Bible stands up remarkably well. And of course, the Jews see Genesis and the next four books, making up the Pentateuch, or Torah, as the keystone of their Jewish Old Testament.

But who wrote it? Well, we are not told in the book itself, which is, frustratingly, quite common. So, a slight cop out, but I give you 4 answers!?

1st: The People: Word of mouth

In those days not much was written down.

Writing was gradually introduced: in Mesopotamia, Egypt, and no doubt China. Papyrus from the river reeds in Egypt was good but not widely distributed. Stone tablets in Babylon were not practical for ordinary use, and were mainly kept for legal contracts and official recording.

In every nation, mothers and fathers would tell stories to their children. These of course would be passed on through generations. "Never forget these commands I am giving you today. Teach them to your children. Repeat them" (Deuteronomy 6 v 6) was the Jewish mantra.

2nd: Moses

In some Bible editions, this is called the First Book of Moses. But these words were added by the translators into English. They are not wrong, because the Jewish commentators, and Jesus himself, called the first 5 books The Law of Moses. Certainly, Moses was entrusted by God to make sure things were recorded: "Yahweh said to Moses, write an account of this victory, so that it will be remembered" (Exodus 17v14).

In practice, people would name books after the key character.

Julius Caesar's Gallic wars, for example, were not written by Caesar himself. He was far too busy winning battles. But his followers, very wisely, wished to give him the kudos and glory. The cult of celebrity ruled then!

In the same way, Moses would not have written Genesis. He had a nation to look after – no easier then than today! But I'm sure he would have influenced it. He had a Court education (Exodus 2) in Egypt. He could write (Exodus 34v28). He would have been the source material for his meeting With God on Mount Sinai (Exodus 20). And he was asked by God to be responsible for the writing (see Exodus 17v14 above).

But as we have suggested, this is not the same as expecting Moses to do all the work himself. He was fortunate: to assist him, he had...

3rd: Scribes

Clearly many of the details in the first 5 books were written down very early in Jewish history. We do not know when, but God's instructions clear. The were Deuteronomy 6v6 passage we looked at after "Never forget earlier. these commands... Teach them to your children" continues "Tie them to your arms"! That is, Jewish boys wore phylacteries on their arms,

with room for, probably, sheets of papyrus recording key issues.

Clearly there were also central copies kept somewhere. The Levite tribe were responsible for all aspects of the law, including recording it.

And the well-educated Scribes were instructed to write this information, from legal documents to historical incidents and stories. In our section on the History Books, we shall look more closely at these Records.

4th: Ezra the Priest

Now this will surprise some of you. Over the thousand or so years of the history of God's people, written records were made, kept carefully, maybe added to, read (sometimes!), and revered (sometimes!).

Most scholars are fairly convinced that during the time of the Exile, when God's people were captive in Babylon and Persia, they realised the need to get all their written records together in some way. Many of God's people were being spread round the known world somewhat. So when some, but by no means all of the Jews, returned to Jerusalem around 500 B.C., this need was even greater, and what we know as the Old Testament was gradually built up (though some of the later prophet Books had not yet been written).

Ezra the priest was the leader during this period, and was probably responsible for this and for tidying up the texts which the scribes had gradually collated. The final Canon – the actual 39 books of the Hebrew Bible which make up our Old Testament – was decided much later.

Note that the earliest writing was not in Hebrew – this was developed later in the Promised Land from Phoenician – but of course it became the official language of the Old Testament. By Ezra's time, due to dispersion, fewer Jews spoke Hebrew, another reason why it was important to record God's dealings with his people before the language died out!

Of course, Hebrew remained the language for religious documents, and still is, but later translations were often in Greek and then Latin, so there was more universal access to what they believed to be God's Word.

The Two Minute Silence

Schoolgirls in 1918 were warned that they might never be married. So many prospective husbands had been killed in World War I, that their chances could be slim. It's hard for us to imagine the slaughter. The total number of both civilian and military casualties is estimated at around 37 million people, ending only when the Armistice took effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in 1918.

The idea of a 'Two Minute Silence' originated in South Africa. The first minute was to be a time of thanksgiving for those who had returned alive, and the second minute was to remember the fallen. It was taken up by King George V, writing, "it is my desire and hope that at the hour when the Armistice came into force, there may be for the brief space of two minutes a complete suspension of all our normal activities."

It had an immediate impact. An observer wrote, "The whole World Stands to Attention. From the Indian jungles to Alaska, on the trains, on the ships at sea, in every part of the globe where a few British were gathered together, the Two-Minute pause was observed."

The Great War was said to be 'the war to end all wars'. But it wasn't. About three per cent of the world population were to die in World War II. Today's 11th November commemoration, repeated on the nearest Sunday, now incorporates all wars.

The Royal British Legion describes the Act of Remembrance as a deeply personal act available to everyone, acknowledging the service and sacrifice of the Armed Forces and their families, across all conflicts.

In keeping the Two Minute Silence, many will long for the day when, in the words of the prophet Isaiah, "They shall not hurt nor destroy in all my holy mountain: for the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea."

give you peace at all times in every way. The Lord be with you all."



The following poem was inspired by the book, the Artist's Rule by Christine Valters Paintner and a poem within, *I am*




going to start living like a Mystic by Edward Hirsch. The challenge is to take the title of a poem and use it as a writing prompt to develop your own.

The Ordained Ministry – Jenny Warrington

At the successful conclusion of training, an ordinand is made deacon to serve in a specific parish, usually for a three-year appointment. He cannot, in fact, be made deacon without the promise of a post in a parish, and is said to serve his title there. After a year of such service, during which he will be undergoing postordination training, he will be ordained priest and will continue in the same parish until his period of contract is completed or extended. In his first year as deacon, the curate is not authorised to preside at a service of Holy Communion (that authority is given when he is ordained priest); nor is a deacon authorised to pronounce the absolution or blessing. Not all deacons proceed with ordination to the priesthood; some remain permanent deacons.

There were joyful scenes at Rochester Cathedral on Saturday 28th September as 15 people were ordained as deacons



and priests



The ordinands come from a wide variety of backgrounds and experiences and include a former barrister, founder of a charity, bonsai tree grower and doctor.



A trained doctor, Jenny has always enjoyed using her medical skills alongside short term mission work in Africa. She enjoys music in many forms and has run choirs and music groups over the years. She's looking forward to encouraging both young and old to have a go to develop a lively worshipping music group.

The services were live streamed on the CofE Rochester Facebook page, bringing this special occasion to more than 2.5 thousand people, including some who were sick or housebound.

Friends and family of those being ordained tuned in from across the globe too, from as far afield as India, America and Australia.

The man who married Mary

The traditional Nativity scene on our Christmas cards has Mary with the Holy Babe. Around her are the shepherds and Magi. We may also see stable animals, angels and a star! While Joseph is often included, his presence seems to be of minor importance. After all, we praise God for Jesus with our familiar Christmas carols, mentioning angels, shepherds, Wise men and Mary but the name of Joseph is absent! Why is Joseph given a low profile? For he is a man to be remembered.

Joseph was a resident of Nazareth. He worked as a carpenter and his skills would have included making furniture, repairing buildings and crafting agricultural tools. Although Joseph had an honourable profession, he would not have been a man of great wealth.

The gospel writers Matthew and Luke give Joseph a few brief mentions. After the birth of Jesus, Joseph and Mary go to the temple in Jerusalem to dedicate the Baby to God. Afterwards, they flee into Egypt to escape the wrath of Herod and much later return to Nazareth. Twelve years later, Mary and Joseph go with Jesus to Jerusalem for the Passover feast. Here they lose Jesus, and find Him in the Temple talking with religious leaders!

Apart from these verses, the New Testament is silent about the rest of Joseph's life. However, we do know that Joseph was father to other children by Mary. His four sons are named and they had at least two daughters (see Matthew 13 v 55).

And we also know that Joseph was someone who quietly and humbly took on the awesome role in caring for the early life of the Son of God. Joseph would have taught Jesus many things – not just the skills of a labourer, but the lore of the countryside which was evident in our Lord's teaching. Jesus grew up within a loving family and described God as 'Father', knowing also the good fatherly qualities of Joseph.

In the Christmas story, Joseph is placed into a situation that brought him misunderstanding and suspicion. But Joseph remained faithful in the knowledge that as long as God had spoken, the

opinion of others mattered little. Before Jesus began His ministry, it is believed that Joseph died. It is likely Jesus took on many of His father's responsibilities before He left home.

In the eyes of the world, Joseph was a nobody. He was not a man of valour, fame and fortune. But he was the one who had parental responsibility for the greatest person who has ever lived!

It is sad that we often equate ordinariness with ineffectiveness. Down the ages, God has used many ordinary people to accomplish great things. God continues to use ordinary people. Like Joseph, we need to know that doing God's will is the most important thing in life. May we, this Christmas, respond to God's call to us and please Him in all that we do.

Weight lifting
